



Playing a unique role in transport safety



PACTS has always had strong links with the UK
Parliament although PACTS receives no parliamentary
funding. Barry Sheerman MP is the Chair of PACTS and
PACTS has provided the secretariat to the All-Party
Parliamentary Group for Transport Safety.

We hold meetings in Parliament for parliamentarians and PACTS members (the "Council"), meet with individual MPs and Peers, and attend Commons debates and Transport Committee meetings. PACTS' views and advice are regularly sought by government.

The Safe System



Safe transport for all

PACTS supports Vision Zero. We want to see the UK government adopt a long-term vision for a safe transport system free from death and serious injury. This can be delivered by safe system policies that reduce danger and mitigate the consequences of collisions.

Unique features of PACTS

- a multi-modal transport safety body, covering road, rail and air
- strong links with the UK Parliament
- focused on government, parliamentarians, professionals and key stakeholders
- an independent charity no financial or sectoral interests

Safety and sustainability

PACTS fully recognises and supports wider policy agendas, including action on climate change, air quality, active travel and sustainable towns. PACTS' expertise lies in transport safety which will help to deliver these wider agendas. To make sustainable travel more popular, public transport must be improved, car use managed and conditions made safer for walking and cycling.



PACTS in Parliament





PACTS was originally a Westminster Associate All–Party Parliamentary Group: a combination of parliamentarians and external members, all dedicated to improving transport safety. Recently, PACTS the charity separated from the parliamentary group which was restricted to parliamentarians. Since then PACTS has provided the Secretariat.

PACTS works by:

- Briefings for MPs in parliamentary debates
- Parliamentary Questions
- Evidence to Select Committees and Bill Committees
- PACTS events in Parliament
- Involving MPs and ministers in PACTS conferences
- Direct communication with individual MPs
- Highlighting parliamentary business about transport safety, via Twitter etc.



Providing information about Parliament and Government is part of our service to PACTS members.

Not only at Westminster

PACTS' remit covers the whole of the United Kingdom. Many transport safety responsibilities are devolved and this is likely to increase. As far as resources allow, we work with the parliaments and officials in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland. PACTS recognises that laws and policies vary across the UK. This provides opportunities for innovation and learning.

Sustainable travel



PACTS has long supported sustainable travel policies. Sustainability and safety issues are related and polices to tackle both should be fully aligned. As environmental and health concerns have risen up the agenda, so PACTS has given this greater emphasis.

The 2020 Stockholm Declaration on road safety emphasised safe and sustainable travel. It was endorsed by some 140 governments which attended, including the UK government.

PACTS supports policies to encourage use of public transport – the safest way to travel. Organisations such as Transport for London, Network Rail and RSSB collaborate closely with PACTS. We also want to see more walking and cycling – modes which rarely endanger others and have substantial health and environmental benefits. It is important that these modes are supported with safe infrastructure, safe vehicles and safe speeds.

Ensuring that rail services operate safely is vital to maintaining confidence in public transport.
